

The prison population has grown 14x in the last 100 years, but the overall population has only grown 3x


Prison population is at its lowest level since 2000 and the incarceration rate is at its lowest level since 1995






How many people are locked up in the United States?

The U.S. locks up more people per capita than any other nation, at the staggering rate of 698 per 100,000 residents. But to end mass incarceration, we must first consider *where* and *why* 2.3 million people are confined nationwide.





Prison Population Is Unhooked From Crime Rate


FIGURE 5 INCARCERATION AND CRIME RATES










Figure 1.2 Admission Rates to State and Federal Prisons by Race, 1926–1997. Note: The


There are over 1 million drug possession arrests each year


There are 6 times as many arrests for drug possession as for drug sales.


(Arrests in millions, 1980–2018)
