#### **Justice and Compassion**

Can justice and compassion really co-exist? Justice is exacting, and cerebral. Justice speaks to punishment, our public safety and keeping the "bad guys off the streets". Could we as a society exist without justice? t is said in the Torah that G-d first wanted to create and rule an ideal world only with strict judgment, where man is treated as he deserves in accordance with his deeds. G-d then saw that the world could not survive without the possibility of change and redemption. Man would not be virtuous enough to survive this type of scrutiny. G-d therefore first preceded the creation of the world with the attribute of compassion (Genesis Rashi 1:1).

Can we operate our justice systems without compassion and an understanding of humanity and suffering? How can we simultaneously account for the historical social divides and biases that feed the largest incarceration system in the world? How do we morally deal with the insurmountable challenges of trauma, redemption and reintegration that our correctional institutions have created? How are we dealing with our failures with the growing crises of mental health and addiction - the largest feeders of the prison system? How can we find ways to better deal with the pain of families and children? As Jews we have a responsibility to create a better world, a G-dly world, a messianic world. We are here in this world to fulfill a mission tike polary. We are the masters at effect using social change and creating - tikun olam. We are the masters at effectuating social change and creating miracles in the desert. Like G-d we need to create a world that incorporates both justice and compassion.

Justice and compassion are not only possible - it is the solution. It is about accountability and cohesion at all levels of the criminal justice system. In effect, combining justice and compassion is more than a dialectic dialogue, more than emotionally reconciling two opposing polar opposites, and more than feeling sorry.



It is about finding practical, real solutions to complex problems. We need to focus on solutions that are based on evidence and data-driven results and not political rhetoric. In the end, when we behave with justice and compassion and help others, we help ourselves. We can change our own communities, and we can change society. We have done it before.

#### QUEEN ESTHER IN OUR TIME NEW YORK SUPREME COURT JUSTICE -THE HONORABLE RACHEL FREIER

New York Supreme Court Justice Rachel Freier is the first Hasidic female judge to serve on the New York Supreme Court- breaking previous barriers and misconceptions. Judge Freier says that while her journey to this moment was filled with opposition, her Jewish faith helped to keep her on the path going forward. In December 2017, Megyn Kelly welcomed Freier to the Today Show as the woman The New York Times has called "the Hasidic superwoman of night court". In 2017, Freier was chosen by The Jerusalem Post, an Israeli newspaper, as one of the "50 Most Influential Jews" in the world

However, she is not only a woman with courage and ambition, she epitomizes the fight for justice and compassion. She is an advocate for change and has that rare ability to find real solutions to practical issues, while simultaneously remaining true to her values and identity.

"Whenever there was anyone who needed help, and she knew that she would be able to do it, she jumped in wholeheartedly without hesitation," said Leah Freier, Rachel Freier's daughter.

- Judge Freier established a non-profit charity organization to help poor Jewish families.
- She was one of the founders of B'Derech, a GED program for at-risk youth. The organization also helps troubled teens with therapy.
- In 2011, she founded Ezras Nashim, an all-female Orthodox Jewish volunteer EMT ambulance service established with the goal of preserving women's modesty in emergency medical situations, especially childbirth.
- She also was courageous in her fight for justice, advocating to help correct misconceptions for the Hasidic community.
- She is a political activist and interned with the then-U.S. Senator from New York Hillary Clinton and other elected officials.
- She served as a volunteer court lawyer in the New York City Family Court.

#### PURIM AND ANTI-SEMITISM

Anti-semitism is the perpetual challenge of Jewish history until today. We have been tortured and killed, degraded and ostracized, but despite this, we Jews as a nation have survived and thrived.

Purim is the first time Jews faced anti-semitism in exile. Haman's and King Achashverosh's hatred of the Jews seemed to be irrational and disproportionate to the crime. One person - a Jew named Mordechai - did not bow down, and Haman decided to kill all the Jews in the antire world. Haman concluded that entire world. Haman concluded that Mordechai's stubbornness and loyalty were due, in fact, to the Jew's essential covenant with G-d. Haman complained to the King that the Jews are ideologically separated from everyone, despite being weak and scattered. Ironically, Haman identified the secret to our strength. It is our ability to maintain our values and cohesion within different environments that is the secret to our survival. Through our faith and self-sacrifice during a time of exile and assimilation in Persia, we reversed a potential holocaust to a time of great joy and re-inspiration. King Ahchashverosh changed his mind and wrote to his ministers a reversal of the decree of extermination, describing the Jews as a "people of integrity, who love all nations, respect government and act amicably toward all ministers.

The heroism of Esther, Mordechai and the Jewish people in Persia is something we can emulate in our lives today. We need to stand with Jewish pride, not bow down to the Hamans of the world and remain unified and loyal to our mission without shame. Anti semitism may still wax and wane, but we will survive. Purim reminds us that fortunes can be overturned in an instant. A time of hatred, racism and fear can be overturned in to a time of peace, redemption and joy. At Hinda we understand and see through experience that redemption can happen in an instant.
